How time flies. As I sit comfortably indoors composing this missive, with outdoor temperature is in the upper 80's/lower90's, I am astonished once again that we are only about 60 days from Halloween, the herald of the holiday season.

Here at Trinity the herald of Halloween for the past 15-plus years has been the arrival of lots and lots of pumpkins. At the time of this writing, this year's crop is scheduled to be delivered Monday, Sept. 28 (not Sept. 30 as previously announced). I've requested delivery for the prior week (Monday or Wednesday), but this change does not appear likely. Announcements will be made if there is a change.

Regarding delivery, I request that you do two things:

- 1) mark the date on your calendars and come help unload, even for a short time (it's a good time for fellowship), and
- 2) pray for dry weather (we weren't so fortunate last year but we had an enjoyable evening nonetheless).

Pumpkin Patch set-up will be Saturday morning (9 am), Sept. 26 (rain-date Sept. 27). Volunteer sign-up sheets for working the Pumpkin Patch will be available after Labor Day.

Money raised through Pumpkin Patch is used to support TUMC (10% tithe to defer expenses) and local, district-wide, national and international charities. Some supported charities have included HeartHavens, Charitas, CARES, UMCOR, UMFS, Christmas Mother, and missionary support to name a few.

A companion letter from Harry Descheene, HR director for Pumpkin Patch, is included in this issue (see page 7). I asked that it be included to make you aware of the impact you have by supporting our Pumpkin Patch through your efforts and purchases and so you know that it's not just me when I say that your time and efforts are truly appreciated. LETTER FROM PUMPKIN PATCH FUNDRAISERS

Dear Pumpkin Patch Partner

My name is Harry Descheene, I am the Human Resources Director for Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers. I've been with Pumpkin Patch, off & on for 22 years. I would like to thank you as Pumpkin Patch Partners for participating in the project and to let you know what your participation helps provide to Native Americans.

I am a Navajo, living on the reservation all of my life (56 years). Pumpkin Patch has been employing Native Americans here on the Reservation for over 20 years. Our staff here in New Mexico is 100% Navajo, including all management. During the harvest we also hire Pueblo, both Zuni & Hopi tribes (300 workers). Unemployment on the Navajo Reservation is 42%.

My experience as an employee and manager is that Pumpkin Patch goes above and beyond what any organizations of the Reservation do to take care of their employees.

Pumpkin Patch pays for the transportation of their employees from all of the different Reservations, some as far as 4 hours away. Pumpkin Patch also provides residential facilities (dorms), laundry facilities, recreational facilities, a upscale kitchen with a chef and kitchen staff, a huge dining hall, extensive safety orientation before workers actually begin field work. Transportation was also provided to and from the fields. After completion of the harvest season all workers are provided with transportation back to their communities.

For many of our workers, it's the only opportunity to provide for their families and themselves. The approximately 1.3 million dollars in harvest labor makes a significant difference in the quality of the lives of my people. Opportunities like this are very scarce on our reservations.

I grew up tending livestock on the Reservation, went to boarding school and worked in local government as an elected official in the capacity of chapter president for 12 years. My salary and benefits with Pumpkin Patch are substantially above what I might receive from other private enterprises in the Farmington area. I have found that the owners of Pumpkin Patch are extremely concerned with the welfare of all of their employees both full and part time.

Another important aspect of Pumpkin Patch is the donations that they make to local organizations. Thousands of school children, senior citizen centers, special education & handicapped facilities, behavioral health facilities, church organizations, government services, correctional youth services and civic groups receive free pumpkins for their causes.

Again let me say that I cannot understate the value of the service and work provided to the Navajo people by Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers and its nonprofit partners.

THE GIFT OF GIVING

I have heard many times lately that American’s are the most charitable people there are. We always seem willing to help anyone no matter where they are on the planet. It is my prayer that this short note will touch this spirit within all of us.

Long ago as a young boy I would be given a quarter each Sunday morning. My Mother would remind me to put it in the collection plate during the service. When at church I would set between my father and grandfather. I don’t know why, but that morning I left the quarter in my pocket instead of putting it in the collection plate. He then spoke again. “You know who the money is for don’t you?” I said yes it was for the church. He said no I was wrong. The money was for God so that he can do things that needed to be done. It is given to repay him for all the wonderful things he gives us every day. It helps the poor and helps maintain his house of worship. Grandpa Joe said not to worry because he would take me by the church on Monday after school and I could drop it off then. He also said not to worry because God always forgives us.

I had not thought of those times in a long while. I miss both of those great men. At that age they were giants I looked up to and admired. Their wisdom has stuck with me over all the years. In these days of limited cash on hand and fixed incomes because of age, we are hard pressed to meet the needs of our parish. I now think back to those days and how little money was available yet we always put money aside for God’s work. As I think upon my great grandfather’s words he is more right than ever. The money we give is not only for a building or the people it’s for God and when we hold back we fail in repaying our debt to Him.

I think that’s why our generosity is so great in this country. We put God before all other things. His Son paid a price we can never hope to repay. All we can do is as asked of all his children and that is give what we can with a generous heart. God Bless You All
